- \_\_\_Smoked Old Fashioned Black Tea Paired with: A Confederacy of Dunces John Kennedy Toole. Why: Bold, smoky, quirky, and unexpectedly complex—just like Ignatius J. Reilly's chaotic escapades. This tea matches the book's eccentric, offbeat flavor.
- \_\_\_Fireside Chat Black Tea Paired with: Wuthering Heights Emily Brontë
  Why: Cozy warmth meets brooding intensity. Fireside Chat evokes stormy moors, burning passions, and long nights by the hearth.
- \_\_\_Spiced Cranberry Orange Herbal Fruit Tea Paired with: The Help Kathryn Stockett Why: Bright, warm, Southern, and hospitable. The fruity, comforting blend matches the novel's themes of resilience, community, and shared stories in the kitchen.
- \_\_\_Earl Grey Special Black Tea Paired with: *The Picture of Dorian Gray* Oscar Wilde Why: Elegant, refined, classic—and slightly sharp. The bergamot's sophistication mirrors the novel's obsession with beauty, charm, and the shadows beneath.
- \_\_\_Blacksmith Blend Black Tea Paired with: *Dracula* Bram Stoker Why: Strong, bold, and dark. This hearty black blend pairs well with gothic atmosphere, midnight hunts, and the relentless force of Stoker's iconic vampire.
- \_\_\_Summer Companion Black Tea Paired with: Gone With the Wind Margaret Mitchell Why: Warm, vibrant, and evocative of long, sweltering afternoons in the South. A perfect match for Scarlett O'Hara's sweeping, dramatic world.
- \_\_\_**Goji Berry Bliss Green Tea** Paired with: *Memoirs of a Geisha* Arthur Golden **Why:** Light, delicate, elegant, and nuanced. The subtle sweetness and floral notes connect beautifully with the novel's graceful, immersive atmosphere.
- \_\_\_Emerald Sun Green Tea Paired with: Frankenstein Mary Shelley Why: Bright, awakening, almost electric—much like the spark of creation that defines the novel. A tea that captures the chill, clarity, and innovation of Shelley's masterpiece.
- \_\_\_Orange Blossom Rooibos Paired with: *The Bell Jar* Sylvia Plath **Why:** Soft, soothing, grounding, and caffeine-free. This comforting blend pairs with a novel that explores the inner world with vulnerability and quiet intensity.
- \_\_\_Peppermint Leaves Paired with: *The Invisible Man* (Ralph Ellison) **Why:** Sharp, bracing, and clarifying—peppermint cuts through distortion, much like the novel's piercing exploration of identity and invisibility in society.
- \_\_\_Traditional Masala Chai (Indian Black Tea) Paired with: The Catcher in the Rye J.D. Salinger Why: Spicy, rebellious, and full of attitude. Chai's bold, unapologetic flavor feels like something Holden Caulfield would both complain about and secretly love.

A Confederacy of Dunces – John Kennedy Toole: A humorous, posthumously published novel following the eccentric Ignatius J. Reilly navigating New Orleans. John Kennedy Toole tragically never saw its success; it became a cult classic after his death.

Wuthering Heights – Emily Brontë: A dark, passionate tale of love, revenge, and obsession on the Yorkshire moors. Emily Brontë wrote this as her only novel, a masterpiece of Gothic literature.

The Help – Kathryn Stockett: Set in 1960s Mississippi, this novel explores race, friendship, and courage through the lives of African-American maids and the women who write their stories. Kathryn Stockett wrote this as her debut and sole novel.

The Picture of Dorian Gray – Oscar Wilde: A decadent, philosophical story exploring vanity, morality, and eternal youth, where Dorian Gray remains forever young while his portrait ages. Oscar Wilde wrote essays, plays, and stories, but this is his only novel.

*Dracula* – Bram Stoker: A Gothic horror classic introducing Count Dracula and shaping modern vampire mythology. Bram Stoker created one of literature's most enduring villains in this timeless novel.

The Catcher in the Rye – J.D. Salinger: A coming-of-age story about teenager Holden Caulfield, navigating alienation and the pains of growing up. J.D. Salinger is best known for this single iconic novel, though he wrote other works like Nine Stories.

Gone with the Wind – Margaret Mitchell: A sweeping historical epic set during the American Civil War and Reconstruction, following the strong-willed Scarlett O'Hara. Margaret Mitchell wrote this as her only novel, which became a massive bestseller and cultural phenomenon.

Memoirs of a Geisha – Arthur Golden: A captivating fictional memoir of a young Japanese girl who becomes a celebrated geisha, blending beauty, tradition, and hardship. Arthur Golden's debut novel became an international bestseller.

Frankenstein – Mary Shelley: The story of Victor Frankenstein and his creation, a foundational work blending Gothic horror and early science fiction. Mary Shelley wrote several works, but this novel remains her most influential.

The Bell Jar – Sylvia Plath: A semi-autobiographical novel exploring mental illness, identity, and societal expectations through Esther Greenwood's experiences. Sylvia Plath, also a renowned poet, captured the intensity of inner struggle in this singular novel.

The Invisible Man – Ralph Ellison: A profound exploration of race, identity, and invisibility in 20th-century America, following an unnamed Black man navigating social prejudice. Ralph Ellison wrote this acclaimed novel as his only major work.
