Peppermint Tea with gingerbread. Cold logic meets holiday warmth — a paradoxical pair.



INSPIRED BY THE LITERARY GREATS...LEARN A BIT ABOUT THE AUTHORS

Agatha Christie (1890–1976), the "Queen of Mystery," wrote 66 detective novels and created Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple. Her best-selling book, And Then There Were None, remains one of the most popular mysteries ever published.

J.R.R. Tolkien (1892–1973) was an English author and philologist best known for The Lord of the Rings, a high-fantasy epic that shaped modern fantasy literature and sold over 150 million copies worldwide.

F. Scott Fitzgerald (1896–1940) captured the spirit of the Jazz Age in his classic novel The Great Gatsby, a tale of glamour, ambition, and disillusionment that remains his most celebrated and best-selling work.

Virginia Woolf (1882–1941) was a British modernist known for her stream-of-consciousness style. Her most famous and best-selling novel, Mrs Dalloway, explores time, memory, and the inner lives of its characters.

G George Orwell (1903–1950) was a British writer and journalist best known for 1984, a dystopian novel about surveillance and authoritarianism. It remains a powerful and best-selling work of political fiction.

Fernando Pessoa (1888–1935) was a Portuguese poet and writer known for writing under multiple literary personas. His posthumously published The Book of Disquiet is his best-known and most widely read work.

Dante Alighieri (1265–1321) was an Italian poet best known for The Divine Comedy, an epic journey through Hell, Purgatory, and Paradise. It remains a cornerstone of world literature and Dante's most enduring work.

Herman Melville (1819–1891) was an American author and sailor. His best-known novel, Moby-Dick, is a complex tale of obsession and the sea, and has become one of the great classics of American literature.
